6.1 The Shed project This is now officially independent of the Council, and constituted as an unincorporated association. I will be preparing a lease/licence for their occupation of the Cube. Their bank account is not yet established, so we are holding funds to their order on our accounting system (as we did previously for the Repair Café and Community Fridge)

FRow Friends Report on this year 2024/25 – Beth Gardner

FRow Friends have had a busy year. The core activity is matching members with volunteers and there are currently eight active partnerships. One member sadly passed away during the year. A few partnerships have broken down – one because of unrealistic expectations and another had dementia so required further help than we can provide. There were three applications that FRow Friends can't help. Three volunteers are awaiting DBS checks and three members are waiting for a match – potentially they can be matched with each other. One new application has been handed in to be progressed. Rowan suggested that she could take on another member alongside the other one – potentially other volunteers may be able to do the same.

There has been a good influx of new member enquiries and new volunteer enquiries. There is frustration that a number of the volunteer applications haven't progressed. The website has been streamlined for ease of volunteer application. Promotion of FRow Friends has been happening through the council, new flyer, cabaret and village market.

Last year FRow Friends produced two cabarets, this year FRow Friends have produced one cabaret. The decision was taken to have a break and plan as to what works best for the next cabaret. The committee are in planning mode for the next cabaret which is taking place 2nd October

Update for FRPC about low-cost counselling service as of Friday 27th June 2025

Number of sessions held – 48

Number of sessions budgeted for going forward (approx) - 200

Number of clients we are currently working with - 11

Average client contribution is £17.72

We are currently offering free supervision to counsellors for their work connected to the service and continue to do initial client triage and all admin as part of the service, without any cost to FRPC.

We have £3565 remaining in the budget

We currently have one client hopefully starting over the next two weeks and one further enquiry

There was one client that ended after two sessions as offered NHS services. One person enquired offered a therapist but has not engaged with the service further

We now have 8 counsellors on our books giving us a pool of different approaches and experience. Three of which work with young people 14 +. Currently four counsellors are actively working with clients.

We believe the service is reaching local people and we have so far done very limited marketing. We would value another article by Alex V in the local magazine as this generated enquiries last time. We are also planning on another Facebook message at the start of the next school term

Notes of Meeting 24th June 2025

Present: Cllrs Christie (BC), Eichner (JE), Evans (AE), Jaffay (AJ), Matthews (BM), Rainbow (RR), Taylor-Smith (KTS) & the Clerk (DOD) & Amanda Sinclair (AJS)

Apologies: Cllrs Cocks, laDjoi, Scott & Volkers

Cllr. Jaffay chaired the meeting.

1. Clarity on our roles and responsibilities for 1. Comms & 2. Outreach

AE asked that roles and responsibilities of councillors and staff be explained so that miscommunication does not occur. AJS explained the basic principle that projects/ideas that councillors come up with are actioned & publicised by the staff. AJS asked DOD for his remarks. He suggested that the principle had 'fuzzy edges', so that if councillors had specific skills to enable projects to move forward, they could/ should contribute to the implementation, while conversely, input to the project ideas could be offered by staff. AE's main comment was that Communication is KEY!

2. PCSO Meetings

AJ explained that Jane Wogan had contacted her about the Chief Constable being willing to attend a meeting with Parishioners. Much discussion was had about the subject. It was decided that AJS would contact Zack (Forest Row's designated PCSO) to ask if he could attend the next Market in September. AJ will contact Jane Wogan to explain.

3. Allotment Surveys

Discussions were held about the possibility of an Allotment Survey. KTS/BC/RR & AJ are all keen for surveys to be sent out to allotment holders to see what they would like to see in the future. KTS and BC will come into the office and create a list of questions for the survey, in collaboration with Janet Lamprell and AJS.

4. Market Stalls

AJ asked what was happening with the rota for the market stalls. AJS mentioned that AV had carried out a WhatsApp poll. BM to contact AV to find out what is happening with that. JE mentioned that he is happy for his stall to be next to FRPC stall. AJS to speak to Emily, Market Manager.

5. Street Reps

AJ mentioned that she is keen to move this forward, although some members wondered whether the idea was viable for Forest Row. There was discussion as to whether leaflets be distributed/posts put on social media. It was decided that AJ & BC would put something together to be put in the next newsletter.

6. Comms Strategy

It was agreed that this topic was now closed for the present. However, remarks were made about the Master Plan.

6. Newsletter distribution

AV to be consulted about the possibility of including the FRPC newsletter in the Forest Row Local News Distribution.

7. Noticeboard & Postbox

The noticeboard is ready to be put on wall by the Store Room, and the postbox is complete and ready for collection.

8. Orchard Comms

AJ asked if all email addresses are correct for the Tree Guardians. AJS confirmed that this is the case.

Forest Row Youth Forum
report to the Community Services Committee 8th July 2025

The Youth Forum has started up its monthly meetups after being dormant over the winter. We're hosting a regular session in the VENUE on the last Wednesday of every month between 7-9pm.

So far engagement has not been great, but we've had a few people along to the two sessions we've done so far. We've been promoting mainly through word of mouth and a bit of social media, although my own personal capacity means this has not been as frequent as I would like. I would like to bring on someone to manage the social media account - although so far I've struggled to find anyone able to do it.

I'm also speaking to a young artist who's one of the Youth Reps about putting together a generic poster to share on social media and also put up in the VENUE and around the village that promotes the meetups. We've received the money from Forest Row Festival which on top of the allocated budget means we're able to pay the artist for his work and also potentially someone to do the social media. Once we've increased engagement with the community I'm hoping we will have lots of exciting projects coming out of the Forum.

Feedback on the new goalposts/basketball hoop has been very positive, and is also saving further damage to the VENUE building! I've been working closely with Mel who has been helping identify older youth who may benefit from the sessions and the whole Youth Services team have been incredibly supportive!

Proposal to develop Forest Row Youth Club provision to provide sessions for children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND)

July 2025 – Contact: Hilary Douch and Susan Worth

Background information/current provision

Two volunteers set up the High Five Club in 2019 to provide children with SEND a place to socialise and make friends. They recognised that this group of children struggled to access the mainstream youth service provision, and there were, and still are, few groups for SEND children and families locally.

Although High Five Club offers provision for all pupils with SEND needs, most of the children currently attending fall into the neurodiverse category (attention-deficit hyperactivity disorders, autism, dysgraphia, dyscalculia, and dyslexia, etc.) The majority are high-functioning, able to communicate and participate in a wide range of activities. Many have associated mental health needs, for example, social anxiety and poor self-esteem.

The club meets twice a month on a Saturday afternoon for two hours. We have expanded the number of volunteers to four, and by popular demand, we have run sessions during the holidays. We use the Venue on the Green, which the Parish Council supports.

Parents are required to stay during sessions, which has been hugely beneficial for parents as they have developed strong friendships and an effective support network. SEND provision in schools is often difficult to access, with parents having to challenge to secure funding/support for their child/children. Support from parents in the same boat can be invaluable on what can seem like a lonely journey!

Our families are drawn from Forest Row and the surrounding villages. We have received some lovely feedback from parents about the club, clearly demonstrating its positive impact.

Parental feedback

High Five Club is brilliant; I am so glad we found it, over time my son has developed friendships and his confidence has grown.

The High Five Club has been a real lifeline; it's the high point of my weekend. My son struggles with social skills, but at High Five he has made friends and been involved in play.

Seeing our children playing together and interacting when they struggle to do so elsewhere is utterly inspiring.

It's so heartening to see the children grow in confidence and sit and chat together creating meaningful friendships.

High Five offers a safe space where my child can develop friendships and I can seek advice and support from the staff and other caregivers. It's a fantastic, supportive space, and I am so grateful we have access to it.

Issue

Since reopening post-COVID the club's popularity has steadily grown, as a result, we are fully booked for every session and are turning families away. Our limit is 15 children per session, which ensures the sessions are calm, thus suiting the needs of the children attending. We believe our popularity reflects the growing number of children identified as neurodiverse, currently estimated to be 15-20% of children and young people in the UK. These children often struggle to access mainstream services, including youth provision. We have shown there is a real need for provision such as ours, and that for children and parents attending, it can be life-changing.

Without dictating which age group should attend The High Five Club, it has found a natural groove of primary school-aged children. As time passes our children are growing older and moving toward the secondary age group, and we are finding the older children no longer enjoy our provision as much and are ready for a new challenge, however, currently there is no provision suitable for them locally.

Proposal

We propose that the current youth provision in Forest Row should be expanded to include a closed session for children with SEND needs, stipulating an age group of 10+. We would recommend that parents do not attend but stay nearby in case they are required. This would help children develop independence and valuable life skills and support transition to secondary school. Such a group would free up places at High Five, enabling us to offer more places for local families with younger children.

Staffing

High Five is unable to run sessions as outlined above as we are unable to meet the regulations e.g., DBS checks, training, insurance, etc. This is why we are suggesting it comes under the 'umbrella' of the Youth Club. We are proposing that, at least to begin with, a High Five volunteer attends each session.

Finance

High Five charges £1 per session for each child attending; this does not cover our costs. We run a tuck shop, and parents often give small donations. In addition, we secured a grant in January 2024 that has secured our future to date and for one more year.

We understand that there would be cost implications for the Parish Council if this were to go ahead, however, we hope you feel it is worthwhile and give it due consideration. We would be happy to discuss any aspects set out in this document, and are open to other ideas to bring our vision to fruition.

Other considerations

- Ensure the environment is secure (e.g., children stay in the Venue) throughout the session
- Parents would be able to leave children but remain nearby in case a child struggles to settle
- Session to run in the Venue
- Subs remain at £1 per session, or in line with the youth club prices
- Sessions last 1.5 hrs
- 2 sessions per month
- Youth Worker led
- Plan activities with the children to ensure good engagement
- Offer use of computer games (we do not offer this at our sessions)
- Youth workers may be able to identify children they know from regular sessions who would benefit from attending
- The project could be run for six months and then be reviewed with the Youth Work team, High Five staff and the Parish Council

Response to proposal from high five-

We the youth service appreciate the need for more focused and targeted extra curricular social settings for young people that are SEN.

However after discussing with staff team and doing our own research on what would be needed in terms of training etc, it is not something that we feel we could take on.

We are at maximum capacity at the moment in terms of our provision and staffing.

It would take a huge amount of work from us, and it is sadly not something that we can facilitate.

Whilst staff have undergone training around Autism and ADHD, we do not feel that this level is enough to accommodate a session that works only with SEN youth .

We do try our best to be as inclusive as possible and do have youth that attend our sessions that are SEN and some with slightly more complex needs, which we try our best to work these youth and adapt our working style for individuals.

Any one is welcome to attend our sessions. Based on " parents /carers " choices as to whether they deem the sessions are suitable for their children.

We would be happy of course to support individuals with slightly more complex needs during our regular sessions and can meet with parents / carers pre youth starting to arrange plans etc around individuals.

The youth service is a drop in service open to all and we do our best to try and be as inclusive as possible but it's just not feasible in terms of our capacity to take on anything in addition to the provision we already provide.
